I am certainly looking forward to some time of rest and renewal.



After a tumultuous year it doesn't really seem possible, but December arrives on Friday! In a year like 2023 we can feel overwhelmed by the natural disaster we have been through and the many problems in the world.

As our Moderator Right Rev Rose Luxford in her Advent Message points out, we are about to light the first Advent Candle- the candle of hope. Our <u>October</u> Meeting provided an opportunity for the parish clerk to report back on General Assembly. I attended on behalf of St Pauls in Napier and found it to be a fulfilling and faith affirming GA. You can read about it in this newsletter! October also saw the arrival of the Rev Linda Pollock from Scotland. I'm sure, like me, we all feel blessed to have Linda in our presence with her extraordinary life experiences, deep faith, warmth, many talents and beautiful lilt! Our 134th AGM on the 8th of October allowed us to review an extraordinary year in which we were all tested but as a faith community worked hard to bring the love of Jesus into our community.

At our most recent meeting we discussed the many activities and initiatives St Andrew's was involved in but with it the need to make the workload more manageable, particularly for Jill. where peace was lacking. We pray that this peace pou may remind all who walk by that peace matters.

In relation to the Israel Palestine conflict we are going to have a special Common Good at the Common Room on January 17th. Rev Anne Weirich, a close friend of Linda Pollock, is going to be visiting from the US. She leads around six pilgrimages a year to the Holy Land and I will be interviewing Anne about her experiences there to help us better understand what is happening there.

REPORT on GENERAL ASSEMBLY 2023 – Jim Spall



St Kentigerns College Chapel

The theme for General Assembly 2023 recently held at St Kentigerns College, Auckland was "Authentic and Hopeful in Christ. This proved to be a very appropriate backdrop to what was a fulfilling and faith affirming General Assembly.

The powhiri and opening service was a moving and powerful service with wonderful singing. It saw the installation of Rose Luxford as Moderator and the passing over of the Kororo tapu from the former Moderator Hamish Galloway.

The following three days consisted of business sessions with reports from the many groups that are part of our church, two addresses by the keynote speaker Rev Dr Andrew Callander, discussion in dialogue groups, and debate on proposals.

Each day commenced with worship. Thursday's opening theme was based on Isaiah 41:17-20 and Revelations 22:1-2. We move in the flow of God's love and it is Jesus who offers life giving water. Highlights for me that day included:

- ♣ Hamish Galloway's presentation on Sexuality, Biblical Morality and Leadership. General Assembly voted for people in various regions to have conversations about the issues using the same model as that for the dialogue set up by the 2022 Special Assembly.
- ♣ Te Haere Tonu (Keep Going) Work Group -discerning a strategic direction for the Presbyterian Church and reflecting on how the national structures serve our church. This is a work in progress but the proposals include:
 - Careful listening across the church; Encouraging a culture based on relationships; Recovering the 5 faces of mission; Encouraging presbyteries to develop mission strategies and Seeking the guidance of God's Holy Spirit.
- ♣ Rev Dr Andrew Callander's first presentation titled "Authentic and Hopeful in Christbeginning with what is wrong"
- Reports from The Council for Mission, Inter-church Bioethics Council, Doctrine Core Group, KCLM, and the Pacific Presbytery

Thursday evening was a fitting presentation to mark the winding up of PWANZ.

Friday's opening worship was based on Romans 10:8-14 lead by Rev Joshua Tepou. The topic was sharing our faith. We need to be: Ruthless in our pursuit of God; Real ie. Authentic about our own brokenness; Realistic -remembering a heart change is not our work but Gods; Relevant- listening to people and their story and Respectful.

Again we heard numerous reports. These included:-

- ♣ The announcement of the Moderator Designate- Rev Peter Dunn
- Earthquake -prone building policy
- ♣ A proposal that the Church recognise the 2022 Bi-Lingual edition of Te Paipera Tapu as its preferred Bible this was passed
- ♣ The second keynote address by the Rev Dr Andrew Callander " Authentic and Hopeful in Christ - beginning with what is life giving"

♣ During the evening event on Emissions Reductions I fielded a number of questions on St Andrews Manaaki Energy program

Saturday's Opening Worship was lead by the Rev Erin Pendreigh. Erin had us making crowns and writing bible verses on them that: Give you Hope; Get you out of your chair into the wider community; Reveals God; Sustains your call to follow Jesus; Holds you during times of conflict/chaos; and is your solid rock.

We voted on a number of proposals:-

- Recognition that there is a shortage of Ministers and that Church Councils may need to meet without a Minister present
- ♣ That a person other than the Moderator may be elected or appointed to be a Convenor of a Presbytery Council
- That a restart of a worshipping community can be under the leadership of another congregation
- ♣ A Prayer of Repentance. (This related to the heresy trial of Rev Dr Lloyd Geering 56 years ago when he was charged with "doctrinal error" and "disturbing the peace and unity of the church"). After considerable debate and an amendment to make the prayer more generalised Assembly adopted the prayer. The prayer asks for forgiveness when we have ignored the fundamental doctrines of the church as well as forgiveness over the way we have treated each other.
- ♣ A proposal for the Book of Order Advisory Committee to reconsider the ability of a presbytery to decline to transmit a proposal
- A review of Assembly costs

As well as the proposals, the Moderator hosted a panel discussion on ministering in non-standard contexts such as prison chaplaincy

Sundays Closing Service was as powerful and joyful as the Opening one.

My Reflections:

- ♣ Attendance at General Assembly gave me a renewed appreciation of the diversity of the Presbyterian Church of Aotearoa New Zealand both with respect to our ethnicities but also our beliefs.
- ♣ I was encouraged by the unity we experienced particularly during worship.
- ♣ It gave me a sense of pride in the depth and breadth of the Presbyterian Church in New Zealand's national life.
- The value we place on Te Aka Puoho, our Maori Synod, was evident with the Moderator, Rev Tamiana Thrupp, sitting at the front table with our national Moderator during General Assembly.
- ♣ While we live in challenging times for the church there was a sense that the Holy Spirit is at work reforming us for the future; that we can and must be "Authentic and Hopeful in Christ".
