It has been an incredibly busy time over the last few months as we have embarked on coming up with our Mission Plan with Susan Blaikie; preparing, painting and carpeting the lounge, having a Fathers Lament Service and hosting the Presbytery Gathering. I want to thank all of you who have had a role in helping and contributing to all of this.

The busyness of the last while also means that I am writing this at very much the 11th hour – sorry Denise and Nga!

Recently, I found a nest. The bizarre thing it was the second nest I had come across that day. Chris and I went for a walk, through Frimley Park, and there it was lying on the ground. Great I thought – I love nests and always enjoy seeing them in the denuded winter trees. I thought to myself, I will pick it up on my way back, but of course we didn't pass that same exact way again.

Later that afternoon I was enjoying a coffee on our deck and what revealed itself to me but this dainty little nest, complete with little



bits of foam, dry grass and one solitary piece of orange cotton. It felt like a gift from God. I have been carting that little nest with me to lots of places, our Sacred Space Whakamoemiti on a Tuesday lunchtime, kids time at our worship and at the service I took at Eversley rest home. Young and old alike have each had the same reaction to this little tiny nest – awe. It is indeed incredible to think about a tiny little bird – and it must be a tiny bird to have such a tiny little nest – carrying each piece of dry grass, foam or orange cotton and carefully layering them together to make this safe little posse to lay eggs and nurture her freshly hatched babies.

It is awe-inspiring to think about these actions of love in caring for these fragile precious little eggs and their emergence into the world through the shells of the egg that has protected them thus far. Where they are nested, protected and loved until they are strong enough to go out into the big wide world.

Nesting is a wonderful image to consider when we think about God, that God nests us, particularly in the times when we are most fragile and vulnerable. As you think of a little baby, it is easy to imagine them being nested, being fed and protected as they grow and as they gently make moves towards being a little more independent, learning to walk and feed themselves – but it is a long time before they leave the nest isn't it.

Luke 13: 34 is a wonderful piece of scripture where Jesus says How often, have I desired

to gather your children together as a hen gathers her brood under her

wings". It is comforting to think, that we never leave Jesus nest, that like a broody hen, Jesus gathers us under his wings, whether we are 9 months or 95. In the same way that Jesus nests us, we also nest others.

Notes from the Parish Council Clerk

I write this after a day's docking on a beautiful spring day. Spring is a busy time on a farm but also full of joy with all the new lambs and calves bouncing across the fields. St Andrews has also been a busy place with one project completed and others well under way.

Firstly, it was great to celebrate the opening of our garden space with our mayor, Sandra Hazlehurst, and other folk from the council. Our young people did a great presentation of drumming and dancing and we can be justifiably proud of this- our gift to the people of Hastings. We also received a highly commended award in the Hastings Landmarks awards for the garden.

Thank you to all the volunteers who helped repaint the lounge. The new carpet has now been installed and even without new drapes it looks great. It is certainly a lot safer without the ridgelines apparent in the old carpet. Over the next month the kitchen will also get an upgrade with installation of a stove, new paint and new lighting.

Another thank you is also due to all those who participated in the mission planning workshops with the Rev Susan Blaikie. Susan is now working on the plan and Parish Council will all get to see a draft of it at our October meeting.

Continued progress is being made on the Te Ra Power project with both the Trust and Company necessary to run it in the process of formation. Chris Lambourne, Berry Rangi, Harry Trigg, and Tony Gray have agreed to be directors of the company.

The Options (Reference Group) is meeting regularly to explore options to improve income and meet the needs of mission. Ideas being discussed include Child Care Centre's, Housing, Bookshop, Maraekakaho Church use, and meeting the needs of older people. If you have ideas, then we would be most interested in listening to them.

Finally, on the 20th and 21st of September St Andrews is hosting the Presbytery Central Gathering. Over 100 Presbyterians from New Plymouth to Gisborne and south to Wellington will be at our place worshipping, sharing, and hearing about new ways of sharing the love of God. What an exciting event not only for us but for Hawkes Bay!

One of the recent lectionary readings was Luke 15:1-10 the parable of the lost sheep.

Lost lambs are a common phenomenon at this time of year and reuniting an ewe with her lamb brings great joy. What a great title for Jesus as the Good Shepherd and how wonderful as the bible commentary notes that we have a searching God who finds us when we get lost in the mess of life and is just as delighted when we are found again.







She also mentions that when they were out of flour, they would use the breadfruit. They would also use the breadfruit for communion.





Then Jim Spall talked about presenting the garden space as a gift to the people of Hastings and about donating a seat in the memory of his

brother Bruce who died of a brain Tumour. A young boy from Lindisfarne played bagpipes, and finally, our Mayor: Sandra Hazlehurst had a lot of praise and thanked St Andrews for their contribution in presenting the garden as a gift to the city.



St Andrews received an award for Highly Commended in the Landmarks Landscape category.

PRESBYTERY CENTRAL CATHERING AT ST ANDREW'S CHURCH, HASTINGS

ON SATURDAY 21 SEPTEMBER 2019

I've always found the Gatherings interesting and uplifting and this one was no different. To be among about 150 Presbyterians from all over the southern half of the North Island was exhilarating. There were women and men, lay people and clergy, young and old and all ethnicities.

Morning worship, led by Jill, was beautiful and rousing, with Kūki 'Āirani drumming and

dancing. Matt Chamberlin, a young minister from Auckland, gave the keynote address on "Discipleship" defined as "intentionally following Christ and encouraging others to do the same". He compared healthy discipleship to a tree. This tree has wide, deep roots in Christ; a strong trunk, made up of our loving relationships with one another; and a green, fruit-laden crown, being our outreach to others. If the roots or trunk are not sound,

the tree will not bear fruit.

It was hard to choose just two workshops from the five available and I think we all chose different combinations. I went first to "Welcoming the Other" led by Sally Russell and Rizwaana Latiff, an hour of learning and lively discussion on how we can deal with people unlike

ourselves – especially other cultures or religions.

After lunch came "Equipping the Next Generation" led by Jennie McCullough from Taranaki who has worked with youth for years, to good effect. One key learning for me was the importance of developing opportunities for leadership among young people, and the results of this. I

didn't attend the roast dinner at St John's but, from past experience, am sure

it was great. The morning tea provided by St Columba's Havelock North; the bi-cultural lunch hosted by our own hard-working team; and the afternoon tea provided by Napier North and St Paul's, were all generous and delicious.

The setting up and, later, clearing up by St Andrew's members in the hall, church foyer, the Blue, Green & Yellow rooms, the lounge and the church itself, was efficiently carried out. The result was a welcoming atmosphere. Our new garden was much used and drew many compliments. It was a great day.


